

## Saint Petersburg Exchange '07

Exchange May 1st - May 15th 2007 (part 1) Jun 28th - July 13th 2007 (part 2)

We spent two wonderful weeks in Russia and during these two weeks we saw almost everything: one of Russia's biggest breweries, Baltika, we were at a wild

party at night on ship; night at the balley. We visited all the famous museums of St Petersburg including the Russian Museum and the Hermitage, were driven to all the palaces and historical places such as Pablovsk, Peterhof and the Winterpalace and as a highlight of all: a trip to Moscow! Our Russian friends really organized an outstanding exchange for us, which we will never forget for sure! So in order to give them back at least all the fun we had in cold

and snowy Russia (yes and it was May!) we also wanted our guests to have some memorable days in Aachen. So we organized a packed fortnight, including trips to big capitals of our European neighbour countries.

Our friends arrived on Friday, 29.06.07 and as usual they were hosted at our places. The first night we had a welcome barbecue at the Fachschaft Elektrotechnik, our student guild. Everybody was tired, since they had had a long journey from St Petersburg over Helsinki (in one of those funny little buses) and the flight to cologne behind them.

#### Saturday, 30.06.07

On the first day we started with a trip to Oberhausen in the Rhine-Ruhr Valley. We went to an exhibition in the "Gasometer", which was itself an outstanding landmark for that old industrial area. At that moment the exhibition "The Eye of the Sky – satellite Images of the Earth" was located there, but also the permanent exhibition of "Light Sky" could've been seen. The Russian group was impressed by the exhibition location, which was an old slab-topped gasholder with a hight of

approximate 120m. We went to the roof with a glass elevator through the "Light Sky" and had a fantastic view over the area. We made a small lunchbreak in the museum's café. In the afternoon we went to close Shopping Center CentrO, where we divided the group for shopping. Group of boys went to see the entertainment parts of the Mall and the girls were quite satisfied on their trip. After 3 hours we met to take the train back home.

#### Sunday, 01.07.07

On Sunday we went to Düsseldorf. There we had a guided tour through the city, where all the historical places of interests were shown to us. After that we went on a top of the tv-tower - great view from up there! Then we visited the media harbour and went for dinner in the ancient part of the city.

#### Monday 02.07.07

On Monday morning we went by a small bus to Amsterdam, capital of the Netherlands. People were interested in different things, so in the end our group split into a shopping group and a sightseeing group.

#### Tuesday, 03.07.07

We organized a guided tour through Aachen. The program kicked off with the exploration of the old city part, the

Katschhof, the cathedral and the city hall. After that, the group went to the university of Aachen and took part in some lectures. In the afternoon we were invited to greeting from the mayor of Aachen in the town hall. We were welcomed in the coronation hall and got some sparkling wine and heard some interesting facts about Aachen and its history. That night we did not sleep... we went to Paris!

#### Wednesday 04.07.07

Paris: After a cosy night in the bus (irony? no way!) we arrived at Paris in the morning - 'Gare du Nord'. We went to the 'Place de La Concorde'. We went to a French bistro to have some breakfast. After that, we went along the river Seine to the city hall and from there to the famous 'Pont Neuf' from where we went to 'Ile de la Cite' to find Quasimodo. After that we went to 'Palais de la Justice'. Then we took a stroll through the 'Quartier Latin' and went to see the Pantheon. Finally we



arrived at 'Paris Catacombes'. After some relaxing during lunch we went for a walk to Louvre and to the 'Jardins des Tuilleries' and along the 'Champs Elysees' to the 'Arc de Triomphe'. As a last highlight of a long day, we went to see Monmartre and 'Moulin Rouge' and watched a beautiful sunset over Paris in front of 'Sacre Coeur'.

#### Friday, 06.07.07

We went to Brussels. First of all we went to the European parliament, but unfortunately we were a quarter an hour late for tour we booked because of a train delay, so we couldn't get in any more. As a little consolation we got a lot of information material about the EU at the information desk of the parliament, posters, leaflets, cards and patches. After that we explored Brussels, including all its beautiful comic walls and the little 'Männeken Pis'. When we saw all that and tasted some Belgium chocolate we went to see the Atomium and everybody were quite impressed. Our day ended with shopping.

#### Saturday, 07.07.07

We went to Bonn to the 'Haus der Geschichte', the museum of German history. We learnt a lot about the role of Russia after the Second World War and the 'iron curtain'. Seeing history from a different 'side' left our russian guests impressed. It caused a lot of discussions during further exploration of the museum of the German history. After pumping up our guests with knowledge about Germany, we decided that it is time to reset our brains again, so we went to the 'Rheinkultur'-festival, which takes place every year in the summer at the riverside in Bonn. It is a beautiful location and it is always crowded as hell. Since it was the 25th anniversary this year it was even more crowded – 200 000 people there. We saw 'die fantastischen Vier' our german answer to Hip-Hop, the punk band 'Sick of it all' and the 'Donots' -check them out, they' re great!! Getting home was a challenge, especially since all traffic was stuck.

#### Sunday 08.07.07, Maastricht.

First of all, we went to see what is most interesting for people that are not native dutchmen... then we happily (well most of us happy, one sick) did all the rest, walked into the beautiful small town of Maastricht, saw two city walls, the old cathedral and everything that needed to be seen. #### Monday 09.07.07

On the way back I completely understood, why the current speed was hidden in the Yaris for those who sit on the passenger's seat: to save the passenger from watching that the speedometer showed 160 km/h! Even it was a speedway, it was not the usual one with 2+1 lanes and wide place around...

On Sunday afternoon we took the train to Cosenza. Well, since then I wish I had had the same view from my Intercity between Budapest and my hometown Debrecen... You could look out and see nothing but the sea and in the background the Stromboli vulcano. It was like some fairy tale... But not in Rende, where the temperature fell below the unpleansant 10 degree, and I felt like in Hungary. Next morning I took a walk around Rende (made some rendering, because Marco must have been attending some lectures). The whole place laid in a valley, because it had a special climate. #### Why do we need the Next Generation EESTEC Portal?

EESTEC had a working web site. Why would we need to work on and develop a new one, right? Wrong! With web technology growing fast every day, programming web sites is happening even faster, and an Electrical Engineering and Computer Science students' organisation does not need to follow an old and well known web structure, but needs to develop (and improve upon) a new one. Only a few years ago, web sites were simple, and there were only a few applications that could have been used, and all of that was managed by one person. Our "old" web site with years became unmanageable. Nowadays, one good structured students' organisation's web site has a CV system, an event application system, mailing lists, a forum, a gallery, etc. All these applications can be downloaded and used as they are, but we needed them implemented and tailored to our needs. At the same time, the site had to be simple enough for



regular users to work with. For three years, EESTEC members Rok Garbas, Florian Friesdorf, Marina Plavšić, Mirko Raca, Jure Forstnerič, Nejc Zupan, Andrija Prčić and 27 members of the IT team (skilled in Plone) were researching and starting to built the Next Generation EESTEC Portal. This would be a portal that offered members and companies a way to connect, ease the work and improve the

communication of EESTEC members, and also improve the skills of the developers.

EESTEC has just released its Next Generation EESTEC Portal. There are still many things to be done, but the main goals have been achieved. The content management system (CMS) Plone is what makes the site easy to use for everyone, not just programmers and developers. Let's first explain what a CMS is. It is a system for managing pictures, text, pieces of websites etc. (so, in a word,



content). Blog systems such as Wordpress and various Wikis are examples of content management systems.

With the new web site we are able to offer companies a new side of EESTEC, a CV system. With it we can offer members jobs and internships after finishing faculty, or master and PhD studies. EESTEC gains a completely new dimension with this. The work, experience and soft skills a student gains in EESTEC, when linked with company job offers, become a very good future opportunity for the EESTEC member. The same applies to companies, because they will have a hard working employee that has developed many skills during their studies.

Members on the other hand get contacts and job offers, which are very important after finishing the studies. Finding a good job and connecting with companies is crucial for our future, and now it is now becoming a reality.

#### How did the Plone My Web workshop begin?

It all began in Ljubljana, in October 2006, and continued with the second edition of the Plone My Web workshop, also held in Ljubljana in February 2007. All together 15 participants learned to work with and develop the next generation EESTEC portal. The main organisers and lecturers from Ljubljana (Rok Garbas, Nejc Zupan and Jure Forstnerič) had the idea to make the third PMW in another city. They remembered a few people from Skopje that might be able to organize it. So after a phone call to Macedonia, the story continued. 4 weeks after the phone call, from the 1. to the 9. of December 2007, 12 participants from all over EESTEC and 3 lecturers from Ljubljana came to Skopje.

The main goals of the Plone My Web workshops were the development of the Next Generation EESTEC Portal (NGEP), teaching participants to work with it and develop it, and to recruit participants to help with the release of the NGEP by the end of the year 2007. Plone My Web isn't just about the work, it is about EESTEC, the adventure and the excitement a participant and an organiser feel. The IT team works like a family, days and nights, at home, in cafés, and wherever there is wireless - even in the streets - walking and programming. When someone finds a bug in the program or has some question, there are at least two people at four in the morning ready to help and solve the problem. Plone My Web is getting to know people that share the same passion for programming and EESTEC. The association gives to its members a new

meaning to being a student. It gives them an opportunity while studying to also work on something, like this web portal, and see it in action. It is the nonacademic experience that IT members get when working on this web site that is very important for their future. When they finish faculty, they will have knowledge which will help them with their job and with working in international multicultural teams.

Plone My Web in Skopje!!!

Jure: The traffic in Ljubljana was horrible, typical Friday afternoonish, so we (Nejc and I) managed to leave around 16:30, instead of the optimistic 14:00. Well, we managed to get stuck in some more traffic. We crossed the first border OK, contacted Andrija and Nemanja, told them we'd be in Belgrade at 22:00 (instead of the original 21:00). Weeellll... 

### **First contact**

### Potential

A year has passed since I got elected at the congress in Budapest. This year has been quite a year. A year in which I got to know a lot of new people, new cultures and see a lot of different cities. EESTEC showed part of the things it stands for to me. Most of you know EESTEC stands for cultural exchange and meeting new people, but EESTEC stands for more.

The people I have been in contact with the most are of course my fellow board members. It was not all sightseeing and meeting new people. There was work to do. A lot more then I at first hand expected,

however this also meant a challenge for me. There was a lot that could still be improved, new things to start and new developed methods which I can hand over now.

So which things were done this year? Within the boundaries of my position the biggest change I made was standardization for the bookkeeping. I looked for and found a ledger that can be used online and therefore is cross platform. With this program it is easier to keep track of the financial status of EESTEC and also what has happened in previous years. It will become a solid basis on which new treasurers can make their budget. Another big plus is the fact that with processing each receipt in the program it gets a number and when the receipt is archived you write this number on the receipt. This way it is easier to find when it is needed in the future. Bookkeeping is something that needs a lot of precision, precision that is hard to keep when there is no bookkeeping program to use. Next to that all the receipts have been scanned and saved digitally.

With bookkeeping you not only get receipts but you also have to send invoices. To make this possible you can use a template, but apprehensive to sending invoices is the fact that you need someone to send an invoice too and also something for

which they pay, something that they can get in return. This is sponsoring. That was another thing that had a lot of focus during this year. Next to a lot of effort we, we as in I and my team: ETT, put in sponsoring, I made a sponsor system in which EESTEC can keep track of the history they had with the different companies. When I began all this information was in the minds of old board members, it was not written down anywhere. With this system it is possible to keep track on company contacts by writing down what you said to them over the phone and adding the emails you sent to them. This is very important because now the next board does not have to start from scratch again.

Thus with ETT we contacted a lot of companies and we found out that there was improvement possible in the things we offered to companies. Our magazine and site could use some improvement as well our events. I said earlier that most people know the two things EESTEC stands for I mentioned earlier, but EESTEC is larger than that. EESTEC is there also to exchange ideas and knowledge between our members and is there also for your career.

So my board and I tried to do a lot of improvement on these subjects. A new site was launched the magazine was printed and EESTEC's image in a whole increased, a little bit more serious without losing the relaxed atmosphere that EESTEC has. It's spirit. The foundation that was made for the career part did cost us a lot of effort and we hope that it will bring us a lot good things in the future.

Although we changed some things and made some improvements, there still is a lot to do and this was sometimes hard for me to cope with. Probably because of my Dutch nature I wanted to change more and faster than the rest of my board.

An important thing I learned from this is that this kind of cultural difference is hard to overcome and caused problems here and there, but that in the end it is possible to adopt a bit but also to get other people along to go faster.

### Vice-Chairwoman for Internal Affairs



As Contact Person is the LC's link to the outer space, VC-IA is a link between the CPs and the Board. Duties of VC-IA are not strictly defined; communicating with CPs, guiding them, taking care of the Junior Local Committees, keeping the EESTEC family all together, internal motivation etc. doesn't seem very clear, right?! What you, as a Vice-Chair for Internal Affairs want to do is up to you; the basic things are not that hard. Doing more must be your goal!

Doing these basics is essential and this has been my goal for the first half of the year, but I am confident that I have done much more than that.

I have been trying to make this position more visible for CPs and LCs and to establish some things that will be easy to be followed by my successors. All the relevant email drafts have been made, all the related guides revised, a lot of Local Committees have been visited by the Board, training on Motivation and Activation in an EESTEC Team was made with a lot of effort, EESTEC Newsletter has begun to live among EESTECers... I am sure that the next VC-IA will be able to do a lot more and to implement a lot more of new ideas, with putting less effort into the elementary obligations.

As for the communication issues, together with my BAs, especially Aki from LC Helsinki and Martin, LC Ljubljana, I managed to get some order in the communication on the CP list. This was done by setting the rules and explaining them as many times as needed. The communication with CPs was increased and CPs were encouraged to have backups and to be responsive and responsible. Those who were the best were rewarded each month by becoming the CP of the month. The idea behind this new award in EESTEC world was to for the rest of the CPs to see an example of a good Contact person and to follow it, as being a CP is time-consuming, hard and very important for the information flow of the whole LC. What I didn't do is to be online on messengers more. This is what I promised

during Congress in Budapest, but it turned out to be very time-consuming and I decided to do things that seemed to me more useful.

CP list was maintained regularly and new CPs were guided. There have been many changes and the new CPs are very promising.

As for the situation of Local Committees, LC Vienna was excluded during Congress, so I informed them about it. JLC Eskisehir has become an LC. And what is very satisfactory, 15 LCs were visited by the Board, some of them even twice. This was the most fun part of being in the Board. Not only we attended Board meetings in different LCs (LC Skopje, LC Munich and LC Belgrade, and soon LC Ljubljana), we also visited LCs in Turkey, LC Sofia, LC Hamburg, LC Aachen, LC Nis, LC Novi Sad etc.

Problems LCs are experiencing are documented and classified and according of that we chose the trainings that were held during ECM and will be held during Congress. Possible solutions to the problems are trainings either during EESTEC statutory events or by encouraging LCs to organize trainings within their events. Training system will in a more efficient way help LCs overcome their problems; however, the fact is that it is up to LC how hard they will try to make their LCs strong. Unfortunately, my idea of Big Brother, Little sister program presented during Congress, didn't really live, as a lot of LCs didn't have will to commit themselves to such a thing.

As for collecting status reports and SWOT analyses, this was done twice and soon will be summarized for the third time. This will also be helpful to the next VC-IA to have a better overview of the situation in EESTEC LCs. Feedback forms have been gathered by Dražen Stanković, LC Belgrade, to whom I am really grateful for all the help I got.

EESTEC Hour was initiated and more can be read in the article in this Yearbook. This was a motivational event and for the other motivational activities, Mateusz, LC Wroclaw was in charge of updating the Activation and Motivation guide, which is made of the best practices that proved to be good in many strong LCs. A lot of Board Assistants gave their contribution to this, especially Gabi Dragoi, LC Bucharest. With help of Marko Obrknežev, LC Novi Sad, Vladimir Delibašić,



LC Belgrade and Martin Strojnik, LC Ljubljana, I made the training Activation and Motivation in an EESTEC Team, which I presented in Sarajevo, Niš and during ECM. It showed up to be a great success. I put a lot of effort into it and it really paid off. EESTECers who attended it motivated me by their comments and contribution.

As far as the rest of the guides related to the IA position, my BAs and I started to update User guide (Veronica, LC Sofia) and CP guide (Vladimir, LC Belgrade) a long time ago and they are about to be done, but it took us too much time. After this CP guide will probably not need any bigger updates (and so will not the Activation and Motivation guide), but my advice for the next VC-IA would be to update the User guide in the first two weeks of his/her mandate.

We have every reason to be proud of EESTEC Alumni this year. They showed that they still can't do without EESTEC and they are organizing even two events. One is during Congress and the other is the sailing event afterwards. Email to LCs with suggestions on how to activate alumni and why will be sent till Congress.

Mailing list structure and manual has been created at the beginning of my mandate and the lists mentioned in those documents were created and filled properly. Next VC-IA will know who is who on the CP list and will not have any trouble to find out how this is used.

Newsletter proved to be a very successful idea! Newsletter team is the team every Board member could ever wish. They were very motivated and we contributed to something new in EESTEC. The idea behind was to make better planning in EESTEC and to therefore have more participants to events, by announcing the events in advance. Since the beginning of 2008, we made the graphical versions, as we are the EESC students and need to be the best in design, too. For this, I would like to thank Elena, LC Skopje, Mehmet, LC Ankara, Clemencia, LC Delft, Ekin, LC Istanbul, Drazen, LC Belgrade and Aleksandra, VC-PA.

In order to do the better planning, Filippos, LC Athens made exam period graphs that will be put in the CP guide for the CPs to see when is the time when least LCs have vacations and breaks.

RoPs that will not take further bigger changes and that will have an impact to the quality of EESTEC. We have discussed these on all of our Board meetings and they will be made and presented during Congress. General Assembly is to approve them.

What I considered VC-IA to be was also the motivator in the Board and a team player, as every Board position is, so helping with comments when necessary is also required from a Board member. These are the things I have been involved with. I have been trying to help with communication with ECMOC and COC, as there is never enough of communication. Together with Aleksandra, VC-PA, I traveled to IKOM Job Fair in Munich and on that occasion also visited LC Munich and LC Hamburg. We also visited LC Istanbul, Eskisehir and Sofia, when going to the AEGEE Congress in Eskisehir. I have been trying to help with IT related issues and finished the part with the CP system on eestec.net. Of course, I have written a couple of articles for the Magazine and two of them for the Yearbook.

- In our new 2.0 Website (www.eestec.es) which I'm the main developer, I've implemented a File Manager to be able to public all IB documents online. I hope this Online International Bureau be finished and published while I'm still the Secretary, that is, before Congress.

### What else have we done?

I've being trying to compile reports from last years from former YBC. I've also been in contact with actual YBC for getting these reports as soon as they have them.

# **Internship Team**

Since its very beginnings, the EESTEC has been known as a platform that connects young people across the Europe in a specific way. An idea exists for a long time that, besides exchanges and workshops, international internship places could be offered to EESTEC members. Being a profiled organization aimed at students of electrical engineering and computer science, EESTEC is covering target group that many companies can find attractive.

First official internship took place in Madrid, before the Congress in 2007. After those internships, a calm period set in. However, many activities took place, and 10 local committees were involved in the EESTEC Internships Programme. But it seemed hard to obtain new places, until LC Novi Sad brought some good news. Company "Indas" hosted four trainees from LC Istanbul and LC Eskisehir in Novi Sad during the summer.

In 2008, work on internships was coordinated with the efforts of the Treasurer Team. Internships are now offered to companies as a part of general cooperation offer. There are already some positive responses and we can expect more internship offers in near future. Apart from approaching companies on international level, we need to put more efforts in finding internships on local level. We need to motivate greater number of LCs to participate in the Programme, and what is more important – to work for this cause.

We already have centralized procedures for managing work on internships inside the EESTEC. This includes announcing the internships, collecting and forwarding CVs to companies offering places, and coordinating the selection process. We have some internships behind us. Now we need to get into second gear! Next step could be making of on-line database, where all members could leave their CV. Together with improved branding and, already running Next Generation EESTEC Portal, this could prove to be important asset in future partnership and cooperation offers for companies.

Only strong organization can provide competitive solutions to companies offering internship places. Internships are excellent way for motivating and



rewarding existing and attracting new members and members are what makes EESTEC strong.

# IT Team

### Content here, content there, content everywhere

In today's high-tech, interconnected world, everybody has a web-site. EESTEC has one, every company has to have one, even the Flying Spaghetti Monster has one. But what makes a web-site? It's not the fancy graphics or the neat fonts. No, web-sites are there to hold content. Be it text, pictures, or (the latest trend), video, a web-site will live or die by its content.

The problem with large web-sites, such as the one EESTEC has, is that the amount of content quickly surpasses manageable amounts. Put simply, there's just too much stuff and too few people to manage it. Enter the content management system or CMS for short. These are systems which take most of the leg work out of running a large web-site. They automate certain tasks and make it easier for users to work with the content, while at the same time being simple to maintain. One good example of a CMS in action is the well known Wikipedia. In fact, most web logs (or 'blogs' as most normal people call them) run on a simple content management system that allows the owner to post text and other media, and visitors to leave comments.

#### Who's Plone? Where's Python?

The next generation of the EESTEC portal (known as NGEP for Next Generation EESTEC Portal) is likewise based on an existing CMS known as Plone. This system is open source (which means free as in speech), easy to use and install, standards compliant, flexible, and works on many different operating systems. One of the most important aspects of Plone is the fact that it is licensed under the GNU General Public License. Since few lawyers will read this, we should explain what this means. Basically, it means that we can use it for free and change it any way we want. We have full access to all of the source code (as does everyone else), and anyone with basic programming knowledge can easily learn enough to help out with the adaptation.

Plone rests atop of Zope (which itself started out as a CMS), an open source web application server and development framework. It is written in Python, which is a very popular and easy to learn open source programming language. Plone runs on pretty much anything, from Windows, Linux, MacOSX, BSD... The same goes for Python, which is widely accepted as one of the easiest of programming languages to learn. In fact, many people recommend Python as a good starting point to learn programming. Python aims to be simple and readable, which makes it ideal for many different projects.

Because of all of this, Plone itself is very well supported. Many programmers work with it and improve on it. In fact, many companies also use it. Some are dedicated to Plone services, and there are even hosting opportunities made specifically with Plone in mind. This has led to fast development, and the latest stable version of Plone is already at number 3.

### What's so hot about Plone?

We're glad you asked. We could fill an entire article with all of the new features and why they are so great. We might even fill the entire magazine if we tried hard enough. But we'll stick to some of the more interesting improvements. The new version makes Plone even easier to use, since it has Ajax-powered editing. What this means is that you don't have to reload the web-page to make changes, you just click on the text and edit away (provided, of course, that the administrator of the site has given you the correct permissions). The HTML editor has also been improved, among its new features is support for Flash content and the insertion of resized images. Automatic table of contents generation and character styles mean that it takes less time and effort to add content and change its style.

Another area with many improvements is collaboration between users. Two heads are better than one, right? Well, with the new version of Plone, there are many features to make working together easier. Automatic locking and unlocking makes sure that you know who is working on a document and for how long they have been working, so you don't accidentally overwrite someone else's work. It is easier to set permissions for certain users or for whole groups, to control who can do what with the content on the page. Plone also keeps track of who did what and when. Or, put differently, it takes care of versioning your content, so you can see what has been changed, and go back to the original if you wish. Workflows have been in Plone for a while, with version 3 there are a few pre-configured workflows, but it is easy to create new ones. The newest version of Plone also interacts better with other programs and formats. It already has OpenID support, and it is possible to use free plug-ins to integrate with LDAP (and even Active Directory servers). Why is this so great? Well, it allows us to have one user name and one password for both our Plone site as well as other sites or services, such as forums. A nice addition is the Wiki support, which combines the simplicity of a wiki with the robustness, security and control of Plone. And seeing how many people work with Word and PDF documents, Plone 3 can index both of these formats, which means you can search in them as well.

### Why do we need the Next Generation EESTEC Portal?

EESETC had a working web site. Why would we need to work on and develop a new one, right? Wrong! With web technology growing fast every day, programming web sites is happening even faster, and an Electrical Engineering and Computer Science students' organisation does not need to follow an old and well known web structure, but needs to develop (and improve upon) a new one. Only a few years ago, web sites were simple, and there were only a few applications that could have been used, and all of that was managed by one person. Our "old" web site with years became unmanageable. Nowadays, one good structured students organisation's web site has a CV system, an event application system, mailing lists, a forum, a gallery, etc. All these applications can be downloaded and used as they are, but we needed them implemented and tailored to our needs. At the same time, the site had to be simple enough for regular users to work with. For three years, EESTEC members Rok Garbas, Florian Friesdorf, Marina Plavšic, Mirko Raca, Jure Forstneric, Nejc Zupan, Andrija Prcic and 27 members of the IT team (skilled in Plone) were researching and starting to built the Next Generation EESTEC Portal. This would be a portal that offered members and companies a way to connect, ease the work and improve the communication of EESTEC members, and also improve the skills of the developers.

EESTEC has just released its Next Generation EESTEC Portal. There are still many things to be done, but the main goals have been achieved. The content management system (CMS) Plone is what makes the site easy to use for everyone, not just programmers and developers.

With the new web site we are able to offer companies a new side of EESTEC, a



CV system. With it we can offer members jobs and internships after finishing faculty, or master and PhD studies. EESTEC gains a completely new dimension with this. The work, experience and soft skills a student gains in EESTEC, when linked with company job offers, become a very good future opportunity for the EESTEC member. The same applies to companies, because they will have a hard working employee that has developed many skills during their studies.

Members on the other hand get contacts and job offers, which are very important after finishing the studies. Finding a good job and connecting with companies is crucial for our future, and now it is now becoming a reality.

### **Can I be in your Team?**

Of course, the EESTEC IT team is always on the lookout for new members. One of the best ways to get started is to take part in one of the Plone My Web (PMW) workshops. The first two were held in Ljubljana, Slovenia (in October 2006 and March 2007) and were a great success. The third took place December 2007 in Skopje, Macedonia (and it was also a great success :) ). These workshops have fewer participants than most of EESTEC's events, fewer than ten. The participants need to have a basic knowledge of HTML and CSS, and other programming skills can come in handy, though they are not necessary. As we've already mentioned, Plone runs on just about anything, and while most members of the IT team use Linux or MacOSX, many people first start out in Windows. Despite this, we use Linux at the PMW workshops, though we first introduce the participants to it so they can get down and start Ploning right away.

Most of the programming work being done in the EESTEC IT team is done in python, though as with any large project, we need people of different talents. Besides the programming, the site has to have a nice design and it has to have enough interesting content to actually attract our members to it. So besides the actual programming and design, we need people to write about EESTEC and to check over the writing. Someone to upload and categorise pictures, someone to write documentation. We would also love to hear any new ideas (pod-cast anyone?).

Though Plone has many features already implemented, most through plug-ins called products, we are working on our own products specifically for EESTEC. Our plan is to have a complete portal where LCs will be able to post their events and participants will apply directly through a web page. CPs will have much less

work, as will anyone looking for information about EESTEC itself or any of its LCs. Besides writing our own products, we are also adapting many of the products already finished. Another thing which is being worked on is the visual look of the site. We are following the guidelines set by EESTEC's VC-PA (responsible for publication and administration).

While the IT team keeps in constant contact via email (it has its own mailing list) and internet relay chat (IRC), there is nothing like meeting somewhere and working together on some aspect of the portal. So far we've had one working session in Ljubljana (called a sprint), with six members of the IT team present. Another sprint was planned for this autumn, though it was cancelled due to of lack of time, as most of the members of the IT team also work on other projects (many of them related to Plone).

So, have we wet your appetite? Want more? You can come and drop by our IRC channel on Freenode, it is #NGEP - we have working meetings called "Online Sudnays" where we discuss work that has been done, as well as further development. We can't wait to see you every Sunday from 20:00 on.

The Electrical Engineering STudents' European AssoCiation is an organization of and for electrical engineering students from universities, institutes or schools of technology in Europe that award an engineering degree.

The primary aim is to promote and develop international contacts and exchange ideas, as well as to improve the technical knowledge of electrical engineering students. The association also aims to introduce students to the industry and the educational system of other countries. Until the Congress of 2007, EESTEC had had 33 local committees in 21 different countries.



#### MAVE - LC Budapest

MAVE was established in 1986. The aim of its foundation was to expand the knowledge and broaden the view of engineering students. Since the beginning, it has been a member of EESTEC. As a non-profit student organization, initially it arranged mainly short-term exchange programs. Since then, as MAVE has become more recognised, our possibilities have grown, our profile has broadened, as well. 4th - 6th May 2007

### Preface

BME International 24 Hour Programming Contest took place for the seventh time this year. The Challenge24 Contest was held on 4-6th May 2007 with the kind support of Fornax. Two student organisations were responsible for the event,

243 teams fulfilled the conditions of participating in the electronic contest held on the Internet. The teams represented 31 countries, not only from European nations but also from – among others – the United States, Iran and China.

The organisers are happy to see many new teams entering the contest each year, as well as the familiar faces – coming mainly from Poland and Sweden.

According to the rules, the top three teams from the previous contest automatically qualified for this year's finals. The teams finishing in the top 27 in the electronic contest were invited to participate in the finals, held in Budapest. The top three among the competing teams were Jon far bestÄmma from Sweden, UPC–Mercilessly from Spain and Texas Codeboys from the USA.

#### The contest

On Saturday, 5th May 2007 at 8:30 AM the finals began. At the opening ceremony, Dr. Gábor Péceli, dean of the Faculty of Electrical Engineering and Informatics (VIK) and the chairman of the John von Neumann Computer Society opened the contest as its patron, and István Maradi, vice-chairman of the Scientific Association for Infocommunications Hungary, and László Csanádi, head organiser, greeted the contestants. The competition started at 9:00 AM. The 30 competing teams represented 11 countries: Austria, Hungary, Latvia, the Netherlands, Poland, Romania, Serbia, Spain, Sweden, Ukraine and the USA.

#### It is not just a game – the task

The tasks were created by PhD students of BME. Solving them required knowledge of a wide area of Information Technology, such as computer networks, artificial intelligence, computer graphics, and more.

The competition was about a spacecraft lost in space, without known coordinates, engines or radar. The teams had to equip (i.e. program) their own ship with basic facilities by means of solving algorithmic sub-problems, a huge challenge in itself! After that teams had the opportunity to develop shields, laser guns and torpedoes. The universe was occupied by the hostile Alien Kwargs that guarded treasure located on planets throughout space. The teams had to collect the treasure and transport it to banks, while in battle with the enemy who were seeking the return of the treasure. Additional points could be collected by destroying Kwargs or opponents.

If a team lost its ship, it had to take a 15 minutes forced break before restarting the game, which proved to be a huge drawback when teams were competing at the same level.

A battle map of the universe was projected in the central hall during the contest, so



the teams could monitor the state of play. Besides exploring the area, the participants had another task: to develop a space rat that was aggressive enough to beat all the other teams' rats in face to face combat. The rat championship took place after the 24 hours contest was complete. The winner of the competition was awarded extra points.

The contestants said they were extremely satisfied with the tasks. Some of the veterans said that this year's contest was probably the one they liked the most. In fact, many teams competed with each other to build space-station-like ships just for fun, though size did not matter and they were not rewarded any extra points for their effort. Some teams developed a code that expanded the size of their ship exponentially with time, but to be able to keep up with points, they also had to get back to exploring the universe, collecting treasure and conquering planets.

#### Vision

This year the organisers received a great deal of positive feedback again from both Hungarian and non-Hungarian professionals, confirming that there is a high demand for such a programming contest. The number of participants in the electronic contest is growing, and the first female contestant qualified for the finals this year. Many firms and well-known professionals supported Challenge24, and the organisers aimed to express their appreciation by ensuring a flawless event took place.

The teams' feedback was also positive, with the winning team from Sweden expressing their hope that the contest will be back next year.

More than 40 young programmers from whole Serbia took part in this event. Since that we had a great number of competitors and the representatives of TopCoder were pleased with the

organization, EESTEC decided to organize this event again in December.

Preparation for the competition was held on 28th of November at ETF. One of our professors, Zaharije Radivojevic, was giving lecture about java class libraries useful for solving algorithm problems. People who were there had the opportunity to see examples of solved problems.



"<ecode> reloaded" was held on 4th of December 2007 at ETF, in the laboratory of Ivan and Jelena Rasovic. The lab was filled this time also.

Competition is divided into several stages. Stage one is the coding itself which lasts for 70 minutes and has the goal of solving 3 algorithm problems, different complexity levels in one of the available programming languages (C++, C# and Java). During the second stage the competitors challenge each other's code ,looking for bugs and gain points.

The competitors were studnets from ETF (59%), Scholl of Computer Science(RAF - 27%) and Mathematical Faculty (MF - 14%). First place went to Kabiljo Igor, second to Stankovic Milos and third to Toroman Srecko, all students of RAF.

After the competition, lectures were held on the subject "Pexim Solutions -

Solutions without borders" and "Agile methodologies in software development - examples from practice in Mozzart sport"

## LC Novi Sad - JobFair

11th - 12th December 2007

EESTEC LC Novi Sad is very proud to be the organizer of KONTEH07, a job fair which took place at the Faculty of Technical Sciences in Novi Sad on 11th and 12th December 2007. It is the second time that LC Novi Sad organizes such an event, with the purpose of promoting possibilities of finding a job and developing professional careers in companies working in Serbia, as well as helping students

of technical faculties to find a job and companies to find best employees in this area. 15 companies from region participated.

More than 600 students seeking for employment left their CV. Besides an online CV database at www.konteh.org (only in Serbian), 5 PCs were set up for this purpose during the event.



The event was well promoted among students and accompanied by presence of the press. Coorganizer of the event was IEEE Novi Sad and IEEE-ISBIR project; we had 2 guests: Yasemin Baser from Turkey and Andreas Koltes from Germany, who held presentation about ISBIR project during KONTEH. We had support from our University, City Government and Government of Vojvodina.

In LC Novi Sad very first preparations for KONTEH started half year before the fair. The organizing committee consisted of 7 people. There were teams for FR, PR, IT and logistics, each numbering more than 10 people, and the full number of EESTECers from LC Novi Sad who helped this project to come true is more than 60.

## LC Belgrade - JobFair

After successful organization of previous two job fairs, organizers had challenging task to meet and exceed expectations that people had for this year's event. Last year, 22 companies participated, more than 1000 people left their CVs in our database, and, most importantly, many young people were employed. Each year, "JobFair – Create your future!" is organized in cooperation of EESTEC LC Belgrade and BEST LBG Belgrade. Partnership with BEST LBG Belgrade, as an organization that gathers students of technology, allows this event to cover students from all technical schools and departments of universities in Serbia.

Idea of "JobFair – Create your future!" project is to connect successful companies that operate in Serbia with students and universities. Goal of this event is to offer job and internship opportunities to technology students in Serbia in order to diminish and eventually stop "brain drain" problem that is significant issue for Serbian economy.



Besides leaving their CVs in an on-line database on official website, visitors could use 15 computers set up just for this purpose during the event. The biggest asset of "JobFair – Create your future!" is opportunity for visitors to meet with HR managers from every participating company and discuss career-building opportunities with them. During the event, a number of workshops had been arranged (by professionals from HR and PR consulting agencies), in order to help students boost their self-confidence and improve personal communication and presentation skills. This way candidates have better chance of getting the job or an internship that they find interesting.

Each time, organizers of the fair are putting up something new to provide more benefit. This year, for the first time, round-table discussion "What should I do after graduating?" was organized, aiming to offer solution for problem of



unemployment among young people with University degree. Participants of this discussion were representatives of Belgrade University, government's National Employment Agency, NGO involved in higher education reforms, and one student representative.

More than 60 people were actively involved from both EESTEC LC Belgrade and BEST LBG Belgrade in massive PR and FR campaign, which resulted in 42 companies that participated this year. We had more than 4000 visitors in two days. The biggest expositors were Microsoft, followed by Coca-Cola HBC, who was also official drink supplier of the event. After closure, our database counted over 2000 CVs, and the most important is that just two weeks after the fair many people had already started working for some companies, which makes us believe that number of people that will get a job or an internship will be much bigger than last year.

"JobFair – Create your future!" became a well known brand in Serbia, and is recognized as the biggest event of its kind for technology students, and as one of the biggest job fairs in Serbia in general. EESTEC LC Belgrade is looking forward to sharing its experience and best practice with the rest of EESTEC, as well as exchanging ideas with other LCs that are organizing similar events.
